

VOTERS ARE WORRIED ABOUT LOSING ACCESS TO VACCINES

National polling of more than 1,000 U.S. voters shows overwhelming, bipartisan trust in vaccines and a collective expectation that every American should have affordable, accessible options to protect themselves and their families.

Across political leanings and demographics, most voters say they are personally comfortable getting vaccines recommended by their doctors and view them as safe and necessary.

Conducted by Echelon Insights and Impact Research, the polling makes clear:

Americans are concerned that political interference and confusion around federal recommendations are making it harder for people who want protection to get it.

WHAT AMERICA THINKS AND WANTS

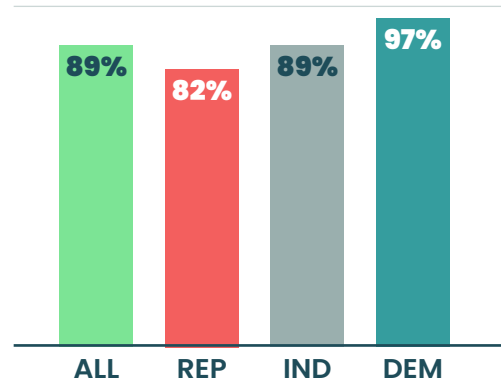
Every American should be able to protect themselves and their family with vaccines that are available, accessible, and affordable — without unnecessary barriers.



Policymakers should ensure all Americans can continue to access and receive health insurance coverage for approved vaccines recommended by their doctor.

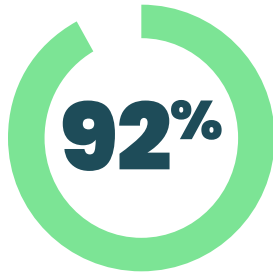


Voters agree “vaccines are essential for public health.”

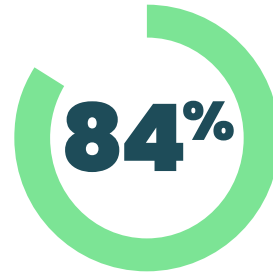


Voters want vaccines to remain widely available and guided by scientific evidence, long-term experience, and established medical recommendations.

Have confidence in their doctors and family pediatricians to provide accurate guidance and information about vaccines.

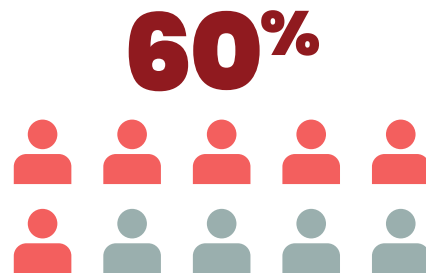


Are comfortable getting a vaccine if their doctor recommends it, including three-quarters of voters favorable to the 'Make American Healthy Again' movement.

CONCERNS ABOUT POLITICAL INTERFERENCE



Feel political influence is affecting scientific decision-making in vaccine policy.



Are concerned that people who want to get vaccinated are no longer able to because of changes in — or confusion around — federal government recommendations.

Americans trust their doctors but are concerned political ideology is interfering with clear guidance.

Voters want policymakers to protect vaccine access and allow medical expertise — not politics — to guide America's health recommendations.
