



VACCINES PROTECT AMERICA

VOTERS VALUE ACCESS

Vaccines protect Americans from the harms of preventable, sometimes deadly diseases like polio and the measles. A recent public opinion poll revealed most voters, regardless of political affiliation, recognize the public health benefits and support continued widespread availability of FDA-approved vaccines.

The bipartisan poll, conducted by Public Opinion Strategies and Lake Research Partners, examined Americans' perspectives on vaccination trends, access to vaccines, U.S. leadership in vaccine development, and information sources. Amid rising concerns about declining vaccination rates and the spread of inaccurate information, the results of the poll are clear:

American voters are united in the collective goal of protecting access to vaccines and maintaining a healthier future for themselves, their children, and communities across the country.

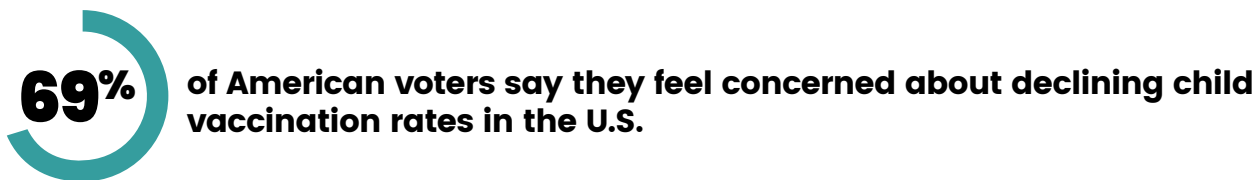
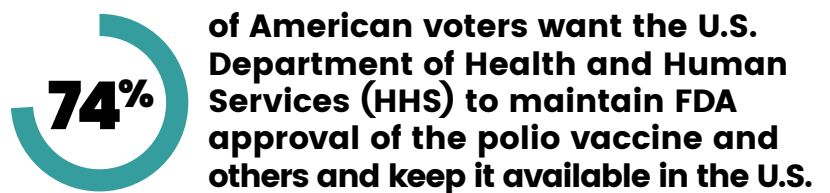
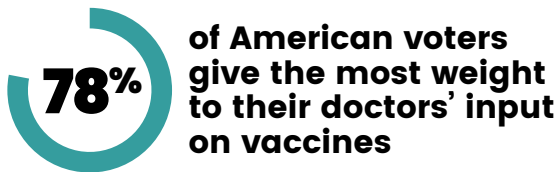
For respondents with children under age 18, how often do your children typically get vaccines that their doctor or healthcare provider recommends?
